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native language (expertise demonstrated by coursework or testing). Courses used towards the International language requirement may also be used to fulfill general education/GCP requirements or a major/minor in a foreign language. Students whose native language is not English and who are studying in English will be considered to have achieved their foreign language requirement if they successfully pass an ESL test of their English proficiency (e.g., TOEFL).

- *Cultural Anthropology* majors are required to have a minimum of *six* credit hours of a non-native language.
- Criminology and Sociology majors are required to have a minimum of three hours of a non-native language.
- Women and Gender Studies majors are not currently required to study a non-native language.
